



Background

This edition of Especioza trust makes a transition from the US-India framework while seeking continuity too. The scene shifts to Germany a country that arose a second time from a bitter and bruising World War 2. The fall of the Berlin Wall meant to symbolise freedom but in fact raised a whole lot of new questions still unanswered.

This picks up on a story of Slovenia told by Toby Applegate and tells a new one related to Germany. It links also to the refugee connection which was so much a part of my Aunt Marie Lobo's life in different parts of the globe.

The first story relates to a selfie taken by Syrian refugee Anas Modamani with Angela Merkel not knowing she was Chancellor of Germany, rather thought she was a film star. The selfie as expected went viral. Anas Modamani later claimed that Angela Merkel saved his life as her policy to allow refugees into Germany gave 7,00,000 Syrians a home. On the other hand the far right stoked fears about Germany being overrun by refugees. The AfD party was able to 12.6% of the vote in the 2017 elections and 10.3% in the current one.

The second is about Rolf Geuldner and President of the German Nuclear forum in 2010 (retired in 2016 but still active). After Fukushima, the German's took efforts to prove that German Nuclear plants were safe. Despite this over the next weekend a plan to shut down seven nuclear reactors was made and went offline in five months. The remaining are to be shut down by 2022. A bitter pill to swallow not only for Geuldner, for 'science' but also for all those who see their long term careers in the sector go up in ashes.

The third Constantina Kuneva once a cleaner struggling for rights for people like her set her sights on a seat in the EU parliament after the austerity measures by the EU, personified by Merkel. A bailout package according to Constantina imposed war conditions on Greece without there actually being a war. Kuneva herself was at that time recovering from a horrific acid attack suffered just months before Greece slumped into its biggest post-war crisis. She lost her sight in one eye and suffered serious damage to her vocal cords and other internal organs. Kuneva said the poor conditions in Greece meant she could not get the treatment she needed in the country and had to travel to France. "If conditions had been better (in Greece), I would not have needed to travel abroad for my surgery operations," she said. Merkel "supported this policy" that hurt the common people, Kuneva added.

From an exposure of human interest stories the lens shifts to geo-politics.

Fr. Bacher & People led Watershed Development³

Fr. Hermann Bacher SJ

12 October 1924 – 14 September 2021

Fr. Bacher's funeral service is scheduled for today (21st September) at 14.15 hrs. (17.45 IST) at Lassalle-Haus Bad Schönbrunn, 6312 Edlibach ZG, Switzerland.

Coming from God's own beautiful land of Switzerland, Fr. Bacher made the Ahmednagar district his home, when our people were in a desperate

and hopeless situation, struggling to live off their dry barren fields in the rain shadow areas. In the true Jesuit spirit of the *magis*, Fr. Bacher was never content with the *status quo*. True to his name, which means BREAD in our local language,

our people saw in him God's gift of life-giving bread for the hungry in the desert. Through the watershed programme, he brought alive Isaiah's prophecy: '

I will make rivers flow on barren heights, and springs within the valleys.

I will turn the desert into pools of water, and the parched ground into springs.'

Fr. Bacher brought the watershed programme to our village communities, transforming dry barren lands and rebuilding broken lives.

Shantabai, a widow in Mendwan, expressed very beautifully how Fr. Bacher's work changed their lives and their community in simple words:

Today, we all have enough to eat, and we eat from the same plate!

We, the Pune Province Jesuits, thank God for the gift of Fr. Bacher to our Province and our people. We have been touched by the fire in his heart,

his compassionate commitment and his tireless striving to bring a more abundant life to those living on the margins of society.

We remember with love and are deeply grateful to him for the seeds of transformation he planted and nurtured, building people, local communities, programmes, organizations and institutions that continue to grow and bear abundant fruit.

We thank Fr. Bacher for showing us how to respond creatively and courageously to the cry of the earth and the cry of the poor;

how we take care of our common home as one human family; and how we must work together to ensure that no one is left behind.

May the good Lord bless Fr. Bacher a hundredfold for his inspiring life, witness and mission; for his cheerful, generous and compassionate giving,

for the difference he has made in our lives and the lives of so many at the margins, who now look to the future with hope because he chose to take the road less travelled.

May God grant him the fulness of life and peace! RIP

Even as I feel a loss at the passing away of Fr Bacher today, I feel a very strong inner calling to renew my commitment to the cause of Laudato si to which I dedicated my work in February 2016 in memory of my father whose name also happens to be Francis. My vision at that time was - from Francis Lobo to Pope Francis. Wealth from Waste (the slogan of my father - I was working in The Society for Promotion of Wastelands Development till March 2015) to Laudato si -Ecological democracy (I created Institute for Ecology and Livelihood Action in March 2015. To me it found resonance with the brand of spirituality I had developed under the guidance of Fr Cyril Desbruslais and Fr Stan Fernandes while being associated with the AICUF and SSU.

His death comes at a time when Fr Siju and I are in the process of developing collaboration between the Social Centre/XINRM and IELA (the Institution of which I am the Managing Trustee). So I see this sudden link brought about by Fr Stan as something that did not happen merely by accident but by destiny (an inner calling - to give back to Society what I have in no small measure received).

I therefore dedicate this collaboration and the potential one emerging at the Province as well to Fr Bacher who has been our guiding light in this vision of the future which we are trying to develop.

Rest in Peace Fr Bacher, we pledge to renew our commitment to the ideals and goals you instilled in all of us.

Social Centre is a philanthropic organization of Pune Jesuit Province engaged in integrated comprehensive sustainable development of communities in the drought-prone Ahmednagar district and other surrounding districts of Maharashtra. Since its establishment by Fr. Hermann Bacher in the year 1966 various pioneering interventions have been undertaken in poverty alleviation programmes based on the natural resources available in the villages such as land, soil, water, forest, air, animals and human beings, in short whatever is connected with land and life. Social Centre is a pioneering institution that designed the "Ridge to Valley Watershed Development Programme" with active participation of people at every stage of its implementation. It became so successful that the Government of India took it up as a national programme and promoted it across several states of India through NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture and Rural Development).

Since then Social Centre has worked in more than 197 villages in Ahmednagar, Beed, Akola, Amravati districts of Maharashtra State in India. It is a recipient of many awards for its innovative, holistic, conceptual development programmes and projects.

From Watershed development to the ecosystems approach

A watershed is an area of land comprising a common set of waterbodies such as streams, rivulets and overflowing ponds during the monsoon, that all drain into a single larger body of water, such as a large river, lake or an ocean.

Watershed development refers to the conservation, regeneration and the judicious use of all the natural resources, especially land, water, vegetation and animals, along with sustainable human development within the watershed.

Our approach to watershed development aims to unite vulnerable communities to regenerate degraded watersheds they live in. This includes a participatory approach undertaking soil and water conservation measures and integrating biodiversity concerns into watershed development efforts. The idea is to bring about natural resources regeneration and check over exploitation of the resources by the community.

We believe by mobilising communities to harvest rainwater and regenerate ecosystems, the quality of life and incomes can improve substantially.

India is a hotspot for the fallout of the climate crisis with 50% of the population depending on nature-based livelihoods for sustenance — agriculture, forests, livestock-related and allied occupations. As temperature, rainfall and other weather patterns become erratic, dependent communities are exposed to vulnerabilities with increased risks and failure of traditional coping mechanisms.

In order to build resilience to this climate emergency, WOTR adopted a knowledge-based, multi-disciplinary and participatory approach involving a wide range of activities towards an evidence and policy-focused engagement with all stakeholders.

WOTR's approach to the climate crisis seeks to develop knowledge, strategies, approaches, measures and processes that enable vulnerable communities to cope with and adapt to the impending impacts of the climate crisis in a manner which can be widely adopted, replicated and upscaled going forward.

Sulabha Warde and the Paraplegic Foundation⁵

Since the number of young turks in the field of social entrepreneurship has boomed, it is time to head back in time and meet a stalwart in the area. Back in 1968, when the area around Sion Hospital was more forested and populated by hutment dwellers, Sulabha Warde set up a modest workshop for paraplegics in the military barracks nearby. She was then a medical social worker at the Hospital and met likeminded peers, who decided to help the paraplegics help themselves. Today, the Paraplegic Foundation is still at the Sion barracks and makes sure that the philosophy of so long ago is still safeguarded.

Tracing the establishment of the Paraplegic Foundation, Warde recalls seeing several patients whose irreparable spinal cord injuries turned them paraplegic. As a condition in which the lower extremities of the body can lose motor and even sensory functions, paraplegia can be a very difficult situation in conditions that are not sensitive to a patient's needs. Many of these patients and their families returned despondently to their home environment with hardly enough skills to get rehabilitated.

She wanted to do something more for the patients beyond getting discharged from a hospital. As she sought for a space in Vasai to set up a centre, the then Dean of Sion Hospital, Dr. Panse, suggested that she should make good use of the nearby barracks to set up the Foundation. "We had a very diffused identity then. It was challenge to collect all the people related to the issues of paraplegia. While we had a workshop, sports and games, we wanted to take that further," says Warde. With the support of Ashraf Macchiwalla, who worked as a medical social worker at KEM Hospital, and other medical professionals, Warde was able to start a full-fledged centre. "My co-founders were such that even without talking to each other, we thought alike. It is rare to find a similar commitment among people these days," says Warde.

In 1990, the Paraplegic Foundation increased its capacity from a workshop to a space for accommodation and physiotherapy. For Rs. 4000 a month, paraplegic patients and their families receive treatment, counselling, food and accommodation. There are professionals here who administer acupuncture and physiotherapy while also training family members to do the same. Close family members are requested to stay with the paraplegic patient with the motto that it is not enough to rehabilitate just the patient, but the family as well. In the premises, there is a basketball court and a throwball arena as well.

The workshop at the Foundation runs three main avenues for generating income for paraplegics. Warde has been very keen to make sure that the disabled are encouraged to help

themselves and says, "Back then, I used to find several paraplegics on wheelchairs near the Siddhivinayak temple who were begging and were even taught, very derogatorily, the right manner to beg. I asked them to join the workshop. Though all opportunities are given to them, our focus on them is as people." The workshop has an arts section that makes block prints, candle-making and other home decor products. There is also a group of paraplegics that makes sanitary napkins that are disbursed to the maternity wards of BMC hospitals since 1980. The stall operators for these napkins at the wards are paraplegics themselves.

It is heartening to see many of the administrative work being managed by paraplegics or their family members at the Foundation. Right from the cook in the kitchen to a sweeper, there is a sense of confidence and independence that resounds in the facility. Rajendra Manjrekar, the workshop accounts manager who is nearing his fifties, has been a paraplegic since birth due to an attack of polio. He wrote his tenth standard Board Exams independently and even went on to finish his graduation in commerce by attending a night college. He joined the centre in 1989 and while he gets substantial moral support from Warde and her team, he says, "We should make all public and private companies into wheelchair friendly spaces so that the disabled have an equal opportunity to live amongst others in society." Manjrekar says he would love to see a space such as the Mantralaya become disabled-friendly.

For Warde, the need to set up the Paraplegic Foundation also stemmed from the personal loss of her brother who passed away in an accident. "I have learnt to use pain positively," says Warde who hopes that soon every district should have a rehabilitation centre for the paraplegics attached to a general hospital.

A PARAPLEGIC is a person whose lower extremities are affected and has usually no control over his bladder and bowel movements and little or no sensation in his lower extremities. This usually occurs due to a fall, injury or infection of the spinal cord.



Narmada, the oldest river system in India, originates from Amarkantak in Madhya Pradesh, flows east-west, and joins with the Gulf of Cambay on the Arabian Sea. The river drains 45.64 km3 of annual run-off and a series of dams was proposed to hold some of its water resources for multipurpose use. Currently, three dams have been built in Madhya Pradesh and one is under construction in Gujarat. A comparison of pre- and post-impoundment ecoenvironment and fisheries revealed changes in water quality, productivity, and aquatic flora

and fauna of the river system. Among the fish, species like Tor tor, Labeo fimbriatus and Labeo dyocheilus suffered most. The percentage contributions to total yield of Carp, Catfish, and miscellaneous groups have significantly changed, indicating falls of 17%, 36% and an increase of 410%, respectively. Percentage contributions to catches of Macrobrachium rosenbergii and Tenualosa ilisha have also declined by 46% and about 75% in the estuarine stretch of the river system. Suitable conservation measures for sustenance and development of fishery have been suggested



The story above caught my attention due to a debate among my alumni class mates on the fate of the Congress party in Punjab. Will not go into the details here, just flag it as a distinct possibility, one that has the chance of the events to follow turning out differently too. It is the point of unity between Capitalists and the working-class/struggling masses.

A similar situation happened in Gujarat when Jignesh Mewani a left Dalit activist realised the need to assert his Dalit identity. What this portends for the future time will tell.

The De-growth movement says no, as part of the De-growth movement, we say, De-growth is real growth, for whom, why, for what and how production is being done? Women are not the private property of men to do as they please as so too the production system built of the labour of all over centuries not the exclusive property of a few to decide as they deem fit. Reproduction of the means of production, reproduction of the conditions of life are very much part of what we envisage. Think of those in distress


And mind your own business
